A MESSAGE FROM Councilman Kevin L. Bishop

Happy spring residents!

I'm excited for the upcoming spring and summer weather because it gets residents out of the house and onto their front porches or yards and into parks and playgrounds. (Spring is a great time to check out Mill Creek Falls, the county's highest waterfall.)

There are exciting things happening in Ward 2 and in the neighboring communities. Legislation will soon be coming to council that will inject at least \$15 million into projects throughout the southeast side of Cleveland.

The money will go for storefront renovations, prepping empty commercial space for new tenants, demolitions, as well as acquiring empty commercial properties to turn around for future companies and improving the appearance of streets and public spaces.

Deferred and low-interest loans will be available for home repair projects, public art will be added to the neighborhoods, and down payment assistance for residents to purchase homes will be available.

The mayor's plan is to target five "microgeographies" – areas along East 93rd, 116th and 130th streets, down a portion of Kinsman Avenue, and around the intersection of Lee and Harvard avenues – for intensive improvements and rejuvenation.

This all sounds great, and it is but it will be several months until the legislation is passed and then work begins. I'm as impatient for improvement in this community as you are. So in the meantime, be on the lookout for the future "No Litter" campaign that will start in a few months.

Again, I ask residents if they see something, **say something.** So if you see dumping, try to get the license plate. Don't litter and call out friends and neighbors that do.



Councilman Kevin Bishop has worked over the past several years on a project with Union Miles Development Corporation to establish housing for veterans in the community.

The 11 housing units will be for veterans who are either at risk of experiencing actual or chronic homelessness.

Council recently introduced legislation to provide **\$750,000 for the project,** which Councilman Bishop

advocated for through federal American Rescue Plan Act funding. Council is working to ensure that the ARPA funding goes to projects in the community that residents

> actually see improving neighborhoods.

Union Miles will partner with other organizations to bring the project, to be called the Walter Collins **Veteran Housing &** Services Facility, to fruition. The location is on vacant land on

Harvard Avenue, east of E. 93rd Street.

"I'm excited that this project will finally get off the ground," said Councilman Bishop. "This is an important initiative that will help veterans in the community."

The facility will provide affordable housing options for male and female veterans, many of whom have unmet housing needs in southeast Cleveland.

Rid-All Green Partnership, an urban agriculture organization, will engage the veterans through interactive programming onsite, teaching best practices for successful urban agriculture - promoting healthy living and providing actionable stability for our veterans.

Cleveland is tackling the Digital Divide

In the coming weeks you may notice our friendly Neighbor to Neighbor ambassadors out in the community. The Neighbor to Neighbor program is a door-to-door canvassing effort that helps deepen connections between **local Community Development Corporations** (CDCs) like Union-Miles Development, their neighbors and the residents they serve.

Canvassers from neighborhood CDCs educate residents on programs they may be eligible for, as well as ask questions about the experience residents have trying to access quality internet and devices.

As the third worst connected city in the U.S., it is critical that Cleveland learn more about our digital divide and invests in the infrastructure, devices, and digital education to get our communities comfortably online. Based on these conversations, Neighbor to Neighbor partners can educate residents about existing programs and lay the groundwork for CDCs and residents to work together toward co-developing lasting, sustainable programs

DIVISION OF WASTE COLLECTION

Set Out Guidelines

- ▶ Please contain all waste in the carts provided by the city:
- Use black/gray city issued cart for household trash and bagged yard waste.
- NO trash should be placed outside of the black/gray cart.
- Place carts out no earlier than noon the day before your regular pick up day. Remove carts by noon the following day.
- You may set out a limit of 3 bulk items.
- Such as tables and chairs, mattresses and box springs, couches, furniture.
- All mattresses, box springs, leather and cloth furniture must be wrapped in plastic.
- The city does not accept construction material.
- Boxes and bags are not bulk items.
- You may set out up to 4 tires (passenger tires only). Tires must be off the rim. Please call 216-664-3711 to schedule a 4 tire pick up.



• All leaves and grass clippings must be contained, up to 20 bags per week.

Ward 2 Councilman Bishop Working on Neighborhood Change

Councilman Kevin Bishop recently spent five days at a Bloomberg Harvard City Leadership Initiative program talking with peer cities about the problems facing Cleveland's southeastern neighborhoods, including Ward 2, and solutions for the crisis.

The Ward 2 Councilman joined others from around the country and from Cleveland for the collaboration that was held in New York City.

The southeast neighborhoods and wards in Cleveland, one of which Councilman Bishop represents, have not recovered from the Great Recession. The area was hard hit by foreclosure and abandonment and was hampered by a lack of local anchor institutions or job centers that could have helped stabilize the community and then worked toward its revitalization.

The community is faced with population loss, vacant lots, homes and buildings, which creates loss of community confidence with those residents who remain. The pandemic

only exacerbated the issues.

During the Bloomberg Harvard program, Councilman Bishop defined the problem in the neighborhoods as a "cycle of disinvestment" that is prevalent throughout that result in a "spiral of concentrated poverty, vacancy and blight."

"I'm committed to working on these issues, and I know that Mayor Bibb and his administration is also focused on reviving the southeast side of Cleveland," said Councilman Bishop.

Mayor Justin Bibb has emphasized the southeast side as an area for increased attention both from the city, but is also calling on foundations, nonprofits, banks and others to work together to renovate and restore homes, support new businesses and

build new infill housing. Council has passed legislation that may give homeowners some relief, with low or no interest rehab loans and down payment assistance.

Which is where the Bloomberg Harvard City Leadership Initiative comes in. In July, Cleveland Mayor Justin Bibb and Cleveland was one of one of 40 mayors and cities selected to participate in the initiative – which is a "collaboration between Harvard Kennedy School, Harvard Business School, and Bloomberg Philanthropies to equip mayors and senior city officials to tackle complex challenges in their cities and improve the quality of life of their residents."

Councilman Bishop and two members of the mayor's cabinet attended the February program specifically to work on a plan forward for the southeast neighborhoods.

"Residents and businesses have been patient, waiting to see change," said Councilman Bishop. "I am working to make the change visible."
