City Council does not hold its regular meetings during the summer months, which gives me extra time to focus on resident engagement and champion key neighborhood projects. Notably, years of advocacy on behalf of **Gunning pool** is paying off (more details in this newsletter.) But wait, there's more to come! City Council recently passed legislation earmarking

\$750,000 towards a new playground at Impett Park and we have our eyes set on raising even more to create the amazing playground our kids deserve!

Lastly, while you're out and about this summer, watch out for construction vehicles working on street resurfacing. Ward 17's street resurfacing program will repair 11 streets this season at a price of nearly \$1.7 million, 250% of what was originally budgeted. And for all of you who love visiting the valley, Old Lorain Road is included in this group! Many more streets in Ward 17 need to be resurfaced and this is a big leap forward as we play catch up.

I hope you enjoy this newsletter and I look forward to seeing you in the neighborhood!!

Douglas MacArthur Academy is one of CMSD's five public K-8 schools in Ward 17. Unique among the neighborhood's K-8's, it is an all-girls' school that uses research-based educational strategies geared towards the ways girls learn best, helping young women become competent, confident, and compassionate leaders.

Douglas MacArthur Academy offers a full day pre-Kindergarten program as well as an extended school day and year to maximize academic instruction, on a campus setting next to Davinwood Park on Valleyside Road. Its staff is compassionate and qualified, with 98% of educators holding master's degrees. Students also receive a personal iPad through the Verizon Innovative Learning Schools Program.

Ohio Attorney General Dave Yost warns of SCAMS TARGETING OHIOANS

Computer Repair ScamsAn "employee" of a computer company con-

tacts you claiming your computer has a virus and offers to "fix the problem." The person asks for access to your computer, which allows the scammer to install malicious software designed to scan your computer for personal information or to lock your computer so that you cannot use it until you pay a "ransom" to unlock it.

Fake Check Scams

Someone sends you a check or money order and asks you to deposit it in your account and wire-transfer back the money, minus a nice bonus for you — a "thank you" for helping. Regardless of the pitch, the result is the same: The check or money order you received is counterfeit; it will be returned to your bank unpaid, and the full amount will be deducted from your account.

Phishing and Spoofing

Scammers use clever emails, websites, phone calls and text messages to "phish" for information by posing as a legitimate business. Never give personal information to someone who contacts you unexpectedly, even if they say they are from a trusted business, such as your bank. Scammers can use "spoofing" to disguise the phone number that appears on your caller ID to make their ploys seem more legitimate.

Romance Scams

A con artist meets a victim online or over the phone and claims to be temporarily located overseas — perhaps due to a military assignment or mission trip. After developing a relationship, the scammer eventually asks the victim to send money to pay for airfare, medical expenses or military fees. In reality, there was never "true love," and any money sent will be lost.

Home Improvement Scams

Door-to-door contactors offer to repair your roof, pave your driveway or trim your trees for a great price. After you pay, the contractor disappears after doing a poor job or no work at all. Never pay in full upfront. If you are solicited at your home, you have three days to cancel the contract, and the work should not begin within that period.

Grandparent Scam

Grandparent Scam

A con artist poses as your grandchild, claims to be in trouble and asks you to send money via wire transfer or prepaid card. If you're suspicious, ask a question only a family member would know how to answer; also, call your son or daughter to confirm the claim.

Sweepstakes Scams

Someone falsely claims that you have won the lottery or a contest that you never entered. All you need to do to collect the winnings is prepay a fee or a tax. However, your winnings will never arrive because the lottery or contest is fake. Legitimate sweepstakes are free and require no upfront payment.

Phony Charities

Scammers invent fake charities. To verify the legitimacy of a charitable group before making a donation, call the Ohio Attorney General's Help Center at 800-282-0515.



Tips for **AVOIDING SCAMS ALWAYS:** » Be skeptical when someone requests immediate payment via wire transfer, prepaid money card or gift card. » Research businesses and charities through the Ohio Attorney General's Office and the Better Business Burea » Beware of strangers who seek new, quick, personal connections Remember, with you or a loved one » Get all verbal promises in writing and review contracts if it sounds » Keep your personal information private and shred outdated too good to documents containing such information be true, it probably is! » Send money via wire transfer, gift card or prepaid credit card » Give personal information to someone who has contacted you Carry unnecessary personal information, such as your Social **Consumer Resources** Security card, in your wallet or purse » Pay to win a prize or sweepstakes. Sister MAGGIE Venior of he Jear WALSH-CONRAD




Sister Maggie Walsh-Conrad was honored this year as Ward 17's senior of the year at Cleveland Senior Day. A consecrated laywoman in the Catholic Diocese of Cleveland, Sister Maggie co-founded the Community of the Little Brothers and Sisters of the Eucharist in the Central neighborhood, along with Father Jim O'Donnell. For nearly 40 years, they provided an oasis of safety and love for the most marginalized members of our Cleveland community. Living a ministry of presence, they fostered relationships with neighbors and built productive partnerships with other community groups. Their advocacy had a tremendous impact on the entire community, especially children and young mothers to whom Sister Maggie offered wise counsel, compassion, and support. To a dozen of those children, she became a foster parent and subsequently adopted three of them.

Sister Maggie's life of service has thrived in West Park as well. The whole family loves living in the Kamm's area and the close connections they have created in the community. They enjoy shopping and dining in the neighborhood and cherish the memories of when the children attended St. Mark's and Newton D. Baker School. Now grown, Sister Maggie's children are all still in the Cleveland area and she enjoys their visits and loves spending time with her grandchildren.

Whether sipping coffee on her porch swing while greeting neighbors on her street or opening her door to family and friends, Sister Maggie lives with a perpetual spirit of welcome. Sister Maggie is a model West Park resident and a prime example of our neighborhood's legacy of service to our wider Cleveland community.
