I am asking residents to vote against Issue 38, which would give \$14 million a year to an unelected group of people who don't know how they will use it. We know it will blow a hole in the city's General Fund. Reallocating \$14 million could lead to massive layoffs and have a devastating impact on the city.

Taking \$14 million ways could:

- Prevent hiring of about 140 police officers when our department is short-staffed
- ▶ Eliminate all the staff from the Division of Recreation and the entire Department of Aging
- ▶ Eliminate roughly half of the EMS staff
- Nearly eliminate the entire Division of Waste collection staff

I believe this Issue 38 will have devastating impacts on public safety and city services. That's why all members of Council are against it. If you want to put the \$14 million in context, this is more than what the city spends on repaving and repairing streets. November 7th is election day. Plan now on whether you are going to vote absentee (by mail), early in person or on election day.

#### **Voting Before Election Day**

#### Vote-by-Mail

All voters can vote from home. Avoid the lines, take your time to research what is on your ballot, and vote from the comfort of your home:

- Submit a ballot application to vote from home. You can print or request a ballot application online at www.443vote.us or by calling 216-443-VOTE (8683).
- 2. We will mail your ballot to you with a return envelope.
- 3. Vote and return your signed ballot envelope before Election Day.

#### **Dates, Deadlines and New Rules for Voting**

**New Rule:** the deadline to submit Vote-by-Mail ballot applications has changed. **Vote-by-Mail ballot applications must be received by the Board of Elections on or before October 31st.** 



Vote-by-Mail ballots must be postmarked on or before November 6th. Hand delivered ballots may be dropped off at the Board of Elections until 7:30 p.m. on Election Day.

**Voting Location Changes:** Your voting location may have been changed for the November 7, 2023 General Election. Voters are encouraged to confirm their voting location when making their voting plans. Confirm your voting location at www.443vote.us or by calling 216-443-VOTE

**New Rules for Early In-Person Voting:** Photo identification is required when Early In-Person Voting. The identification requirements for Early In-Person Voting are now the same as when voting on Election Day.

#### **Voting On Election Day**

Voting hours: Your polling location will be open on Election Day from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

What ID should I bring?

Acceptable forms of unexpired photo ID include:

- An Ohio Driver License
- An Ohio State ID Card
- An Ohio Interim ID form issued by the Bureau of Motor Vehicles
- A U.S. passport or passport card
- A U.S. Military ID card, Ohio National Guard ID card, or U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs ID card (that includes the voter's name and photograph)

# The Davis Housing Complex Ribbon Cutting



The Davis, another anchor to the growing E. 105th corridor, is nearly complete and a ribbon cutting to officially open the housing complex is expected later this fall.

"The Davis" housing complex at 10700 Churchill Ave, is named after the former Harry E. Davis School where it was constructed, and will offer **52 market rate one- to threebedroom units.** 

Councilman Kevin Conwell believes The Davis is going to benefit older residents in the area who may be looking to downsize their homes and for residents who work in University Circle.

A University Hospital resource center, designed to help fight against health inequity, will be located on the site. There will be telehealth services, a food pantry, programs for pregnant mothers and senior citizens, as well as a playground. The University Hospitals resource center will include a workout facility, on-site nurses.

The **\$12 million project** is collaboration with the City of Cleveland, the Cuyahoga Metropolitan Housing Authority, the Cleveland Metropolitan School District, and University Hospitals to develop a 2,500-square-foot Community Outreach Center, which will focus on health education and workforce training, and include a business and fitness center.

There will be telehealth services, a food pantry, programs for pregnant mothers and senior citizens. The apartment homes and townhomes will be affordable to residents at or below 60 percent of area median income

Additionally, because of The Davis' proximity to University Circle, it gives residents the ability to visit the cultural, health, educational and civic assets of University Circle.

# New Senior Apartments Planned for Glenville

Ground breaking for the new Garrett Square Senior Apartments is expected this fall. The new construction will include a 49-unit building for seniors 55 and older on Superior Avenue in Cleveland.

In partnership with Famicos Foundation, the \$8 million Garret Square project will capitalize on redevelopment efforts underway in the Glenville neighborhood of Cleveland and its close proximity to E. 124th and Superior Avenue. The apartments will be for those 55 and older who have incomes between 30% and 60% of the area's median income which is less than \$27,000 in Glenville.

At Garrett Square Senior Apartments, residents will be connected to supportive and community-based services through an experienced service coordinator. In addition, the project's team has partnered with St.



Martin De Porres Family Center to provide additional health, wellness, and socialization activities, according to a Famicos project summary.

"This is another great new project that will help seniors who want to stay in the neighborhood, but want to downsize to something affordable, move into new construction," said Councilman Kevin Conwell.

On-site amenities include a fitness center with senior-specific equipment, a community room with kitchenette, laundry facilities, plus enhanced site and building security.

# The Center For Arts-Inspired Learning Celebrates the Power of Arts Education and Honors Councilman Kevin Conwell

In June, the Center for Arts-Inspired Learning (CAL) honored Councilman Kevin Conwell at its fundraiser, Illuminate, at City Hall. The Cleveland arts-education nonprofit recognized Conwell as a local arts champion while raising funds to support outstanding arts-integrated programming for K-12 youth in Northeast Ohio.

The evening included entertainment from local artists, a silent auction, heavy hors d'oeuvres and a cash bar. Attendees were also able to view the "Inspiration Gallery", which highlights the creative works of students and local artists drawing

connections to CAL's mission and celebrating the importance of arts education in the region.

"Arts education made such an incredible difference in my life. Having opportunities as a youth to sing, dance, and act paved the way for my career as an artist, but it also gave me the creative tools to be a leader and give back to the community," says CEO and President Sheffia Randall-Nickerson. "It's what is so inspiring about Councilman Conwell. He's also

an artist and understands the impact that the arts can have on the kids here."

"The arts help build self-discipline in children and teaches the principles of character and transferable life skills like being a good parent and being a good citizen. Children are gaining confidence and self-esteem and learning organizational skills to help them be successful," says Councilman Kevin Conwell, the event's honoree.

"I know being an artist myself, music helped







save my life. While going through my fight with cancer, I practiced every day, and it kept my mind off going through that trouble. The arts helped me have resilience and kept my spirit up."



Sponsored a resolution urging the Board of **Trustees of Cleveland State University College** of Law to consider renaming the law school after African-American lawyer Charles Hamilton **Houston.** Charles Hamilton Houston was the dean of Howard University Law School and was first special counsel for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP); Houston believed that the law could be used to fight racial discrimination and encouraged his students to work for such social purpose; Houston graduated from Amherst College and Harvard Law School, and played a significant role in dismantling Jim Crow laws; and from 1929-1935, during his time as dean of Howard University Law School, Houston influenced nearly one-quarter of all the black lawyers in the United States, including former student Thurgood

Marshall, who became a United States Supreme Court justice. Councilman Conwell has previously sponsored legislation calling on CMSD to rename schools that currently have slave holder names, some of which have been since changed, and called on CSU to rename its John Marshall School of Law which was also renamed.

- As chair of Council's Health, Human Services & the Arts committee I routinely sponsor legislation that compliments the work of the city's Health Department, including recently asking Director of Public Health to apply for and accept a grant from the Ohio Commission on Minority Health for the continuation of the Cleveland Office on Minority Health.
- ✓ Repayement of E. 123rd Street, with a cost of just under \$1.2 million.
- ✓ Established "Playing it Forward" which went on hiatus for a time during the pandemic but is ramping up again. We recently did an instrument drive in mid-October. There will be future drives for gently used instruments. And all the instruments collected go for free music programs for 3rd through 12th grade students.
