What you should know about Issue 38

The proposed charter amendment would place millions of dollars of budget decisions in the hands of inexperienced, unaccountable, and unelected people -

risking safety & services.

This charter amendment would cut a \$14 million hole into the **budget** and be have a real and **negative** impact on our safety and services.

It is an **inequitable process** and favors residents who are better off financially or have more free time to participate in community meetings and votes.

There's **no way to know** if non-Clevelanders will be involved in deciding how crucial dollars are spent, and people as young as 13-years-old will be decision makers.

Voting Before Election Day Vote-by-Mail

All voters can vote from home. Avoid the lines, take your time to research what is on your ballot, and vote from the comfort of your home:

- 1. Submit a ballot application to vote from home. You can print or request a ballot application online at www.443vote.us or by calling 216-443-VOTE (8683).
- 2. We will mail your ballot to you with a return envelope.
- 3. Vote and return your signed ballot envelope before Election Day.

Dates, Deadlines and New Rules for Voting

New Rule: the deadline to submit Vote-by-Mail ballot applications has changed. Vote-by-Mail ballot applications must be received by the Board of Elections on or before October 31st.

November 7, 2023 General Election Information



Vote-by-Mail ballots must be postmarked on or before November **6th.** Hand delivered ballots may be dropped off at the Board of Elections until 7:30 p.m. on Election Day.

Voting Location Changes: Your voting location may have been changed for the November 7, 2023 General Election. Voters are encouraged to confirm their voting location when making their voting plans. Confirm your voting location at www.443vote.us or by calling 216-443-VOTE (8683).

New Rules for Early In-Person Voting: Photo identification is required when Early In-Person Voting. The identification requirements for Early In-Person Voting are now the same as when voting on Election Day.

Voting On Election Day

Voting hours: Your polling location will be open on Election Day from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

What ID should I bring?

Acceptable forms of unexpired photo ID include:

- An Ohio Driver License
- · An Ohio State ID Card
- · An Ohio Interim ID form issued by the Bureau of Motor Vehicles
- A U.S. passport or passport card
- · A U.S. Military ID card, Ohio National Guard ID card, or U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs ID card (that includes the voter's name and photograph)

Neighbor Up Action Grants

Neighbor Up Action Grants fuel the power of neighbors to make the change they want to see in their communities.



Grants range from \$500 to \$5,000, and are meant to spur small, grassroots

community projects throughout Cleveland and East Cleveland. Grants may be used for a wide variety of projects, and groups are encouraged to think in new ways about what will work in their communities and with whom they might partner.

Groups may submit one proposal per round. Groups may receive funding once per calendar year—either in Spring or Fall, but not both.

Neighbor Up Action Grants have three main purposes:

- 1. Build Resident Leadership & Ownership in Their Neighborhood: Stimulate and support projects designed and implemented by groups of neighbors that address neighborhood issues. Grants are intended to support the work of everyday people out of their mutual self-interest. We are looking for ideas that originate with a group of people from a neighborhood that are being moved into action as a project, event, or activity. The intent is to support residents as active citizens. Grants are not intended to be used as start-up funds to create more nonprofits, to support established non-profits, or to develop more social service programs.
- 2. Build Community, Especially Across Lines of Difference: Encourage new and stronger relationships between diverse residents of the community, among grassroots groups, and between grassroots groups and more established organizations: Building relationships is key to transforming neighborhoods. Projects must have the potential to build and strengthen positive relationships inside the neighborhood and must be inclusive and equitable in their design and implementation. By 'across lines of difference', we mean building trust and understanding across things that many times separate us (racial, ethnic, religious, generational, geographic, socio-economic, homeowner-renters, resident -institutional, etc.)
- 3. Build Power: Support opportunities to develop community leadership, organizational capacity and build community capacity: our grants are intended to help support community members develop their leadership skills and make clear the possibilities of what they can do when they come together.

Applications are reviewed and decisions are made by a committee of Cleveland and East Cleveland residents.

Grant applications for the next round of funding are due by Monday, February 12, 2024 at 11:59 pm.



DIVISION OF WASTE COLLECTION **Set Out Guidelines**

- ▶ Please contain all waste in the carts provided by the city:
 - Use black/gray city issued cart for household trash and bagged yard waste.
- NO trash should be placed outside of the black/gray cart.
- ▶ Place carts out no earlier than noon the day before your regular pick up day.

Remove carts by noon the following day.

You may set out a limit of 3 bulk items.


- Such as tables and chairs, mattresses and box springs, couches, furniture.
- All mattresses, box springs, leather and cloth furniture must be wrapped in plastic.
- The city does not accept construction material.
- Boxes and bags are not bulk items.
- ▶ You may set out up to 4 tires (passenger tires only). Tires must be off the rim.

Come rain, sleet or snow, count on Ken Weidus! A home delivery volunteer with Senior Citizen Resources since 2017, Ken doesn't let any weather get in the way of getting meals to those in need. Driving his own vehicle, he currently has three routes and delivers five days a week, Monday through Friday. His mission began six years ago when his pastor asked if wanted something to keep him busy one day a week, and Ken has now become the organization's most reliable and efficient volunteer. He loves getting lots of exercise as well as meeting and visiting the folks on his routes.

Born and raised in Cleveland, Mr. Weidus has lived most of his life in Old Brooklyn where he has always enjoyed walking in the neighborhood. He has one brother and two sisters, plus nine nieces and nephews and 15 great nieces and nephews, so needless to say, his family keeps him very busy! Ken had a long career as a quality control engineer; first at Teledyne Republic Manufacturing and then Curtiss-Wright, where he retired after 41 years. In his retirement he coached for a little league team in West Park for a time and is still an active volunteer at St. James Lutheran Church. A pancreatic cancer survivor for more than 20 years, Ken has a great attitude and appreciation for life.

Mr. Weidus is an avid Cleveland Browns fan and season ticket holder. Ken's father originally bought season tickets in 1950, and when the team was reactivated and began playing in 1999, he handed down the tickets to Ken.
