
Joe is a very active parishioner of Holy Redeemer Church, beautifully decorating for Easter and Christmas Celebrations. He has been a choir member for over 50 years.

WINTER SNOW PLAN FOR CITY STREETS

Plowing is provided to primary and main secondary streets throughout the city. Service is directed first at main streets until they are passable, then service is redirected to residential streets as soon as possible.

As soon as snow plow drivers report road conditions, supervisors direct trucks accordingly. The goal is to plow all streets within 24 to 72 hours after a major snow event depending on the actual amount of snow fall and weather conditions.

Residents should find OFF STREET PARKING in advance of snow plows coming down the street; for cars and vehicles which have not moved, pose a serious hazard to traffic and make it difficult to clear the roadway. For abandoned or snowed-in cars on your street call 216-623-5505 and provide as much information as possible to the Fifth District Police. - Being at or below 120 percent of Median Household Income (MHI).
- Have been impacted by COVID-19, such as the loss of income, childcare needs, or illness.

As of this writing, the City's Civil Emergency has been extended by the Mayor to December 31st. This affects mass gatherings and access to public facilities and obviously affects businesses, as well. Each day has been a learning experience and only time will tell about what further restrictions will be placed upon us and our businesses as we go into next year. Please, when you go out to shop or eat support our local businesses who have been severely hurt by the shutdown or lack of business.

It goes without saying that if a vaccine and cure is not available, widespread and as soon as possible, who is to say what we could experience during the first quarter of the year and beyond. So, I, like you, will be paying great attention to any and all future public announcements.

Even though the virus has affected us in a big way, work goes on in the ward and projects continue to proceed. On that note, we are finally in the homestretch of the East 185 Street/ Marcella Road Storm Sewer Project. I don't have to tell anyone who have tried to navigate East 185th Street for all of this year as to what a challenge this has been. I personally have looked upon it like having to undergo root canal; painful but necessary. This \$15 million project was wholly intended to address the ongoing basement flooding we have experienced for years along the entire East 185th Street corridor and adjacent streets. I wish to thank all of the residents and merchants for their patience, understanding and support during this project. I also wish to thank the Administration and my colleagues in Council for their support of this project. By the way, this has been the most expensive WPC neighborhood project to date. It goes without saying, I am committed to addressing the infrastructure concerns and problems throughout our ward. In addition, I am working with the Greater Collinwood **Development Corporation along with** Councilman Hairston (Ward 10) on a streetscape and beautification project for Five Pointes at St. Clair Avenue, East 152 Street and Ivanhoe Road.

Five Pointes is the heart of the greater Collinwood community and what symbolizes this area more than anything else is the historic Collinwood High School (CHS). As a result of all the hard work as a result of the passage of Issue 68, we now look forward to moving the re-imagining of CHS forward with the hope of creating a true career center on this campus. More information will be forthcoming.

The conversion of the landmarked Henry W. Longfellow School, on East 140 Street at Darley Avenue, into a state-of-the-art Senior Citizens Housing Complex is, once again, moving forward. This project was delayed by the pandemic. Final funding has been approved by the State and we now anticipate an official groundbreaking sometime in late Spring. This is a project that is very dear to me, for my family lived on Darley Avenue for years and I know firsthand how much the school meant to that entire neighborhood. It now will have a new life servicing perhaps some of those who once attended school there.

Another institution of which I am passionate about is the Greater Cleveland FoodBank. Last week they announced, after more than a year of planning and discussions, their plans for a \$40 million facility renovation and expansion which includes the repurposing of their current facility on S. Waterloo Road and the new construction of a new 126,000 square foot warehouse and distribution center on 18 acres on Coit Road in Ward 8 adjacent to the Cleveland Job Corps. This project will hopefully reenergize the entire Coit Road/Kirby Avenue Industrial area. Years ago, when I supplied ward funds toward

the construction of their present building, I could never had imagined the role this facility would play in the lives of so many families and support so many non-profit organizations. The demand placed upon them this year alone has been incredible. I have seen this first hand while volunteering at their food distribution programs. I am working with their Staff and Board to make this expansion a reality and they are planning a groundbreaking in 2021, if everything goes according to plan.

We are also looking at a host of other initiatives and projects in the Ward 8 community including in the East Glenville neighborhood and the St. Clair Avenue Corridor including the continued demolition of condemned and hazardous structures in partnership with GCDC. We are working with them on a whole host of initiatives and projects. See the GCDC website for additional information.

I don't have to tell anyone how important public safety has been during this pandemic. Nationally, there has been an increase in crime and violent behavior and Cleveland has not been immune. I want to make it perfectly clear to all, as I have stated before, that to defund the police and to vilify members of Law **Enforcement is not the answer and I refuse** to endorse those ill-conceived thoughts and **proposals.** What I hear daily from residents of Ward 8 is that they want more police officers on the street not less, real community policing and a Department that is accountable, professionally managed and one that is reflective of the City's diverse ethnic and racial populations. Criminals have taken advantage of the pandemic; there is no doubt about that. On the other hand, we as concerned citizens, must look out for each other more than ever before. As it has been repeatedly said by our Commander, Sammy Morris, of the 5th District, if you see something, say something. The greatest deterrent to crime and violence, besides our "men and women in blue," who protect us daily, is a concerned and engaged citizenry. Let's all recommit to keeping Ward 8 the safest community on Cleveland's east side.

Finally, I wish to thank all of you who have been engaged in our community along with all the churches, groups and organizations who have gone above the "call and duty" in responding to the needs of the community during these difficult times. I look forward to working with all of you throughout 2020 and beyond.

Please, do not forget the businesses in the community or the institutions and/or the organizations which serve this community. During this time of giving, remember these in your generosity and patronage. They cannot do what they do if the rest of us do not support them.

PLEASE BE ADVISED THIS IS ILLEGAL!


A ticket can be issued for \$150 by CPD for violation and parking within the setback. In addition, your vehicle could be towed if it is parked on a city or county landbank lot.

- Older people are more susceptible to getting frostbite and hypothermia (a drop in body temperature) and this can cause illness.
- Stay inside as much as possible. If you avoid getting cold air in your lungs. warm footwear and dress in layers. Wear a hat and gloves and cover your mouth to have to go out cover all exposed areas. Wear
- Keep a list of emergency phone numbers next to your phone
- Check your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors to be sure they are in working order.
- If you are using a space heater keep it at least 3 feet from furniture and draperies. Heaters that use liquid fuel, if faulty, may cause carbon monoxide poisoning.
- and/or don't exercise regularly. Be sure to check with a doctor before shoveling snow if you have heart problems
- Replace rubber tips on canes, walkers, "ice picks" that fit on the ends of canes and crutches. Home health care stores sell and walkers to provide extra traction
- Understand your prescription drugs. more susceptible to cold. Ask your doctor if you should be taking extra precautions. Be aware that some medicines make people
- Have chimneys, furnaces and flues checked before using them.
- Wrap inside pipes with insulation to keep them from freezing.
- Make sure to have extra food, blankets flashlight and extra batteries. and water available along with a
