through the language access plan that can bring on a translator to the phone call, having bilingual staff during these times is very important, the councilwoman said.

The outreach to Hispanic churches and organizations to bolster vaccination efforts is also important.

"I so appreciated and applaud the students, teachers and community members that came out to help with the cleanup," Councilwoman Santana said. "This isn't the first cleanup and it won't be the last."


Paper and Cardboard Recycling

Seymour Avenue and Clark-Fulton Neighborhood Rebound

In 2013, the Clark-Fulton neighborhood was shocked when three young women held hostage for eight years were freed. Businesses and newcomers shied away from the area for several years.

But much has changed for the better. Today, Clark-Fulton is dotted with recently completed projects, current construction sites, and property that developers have their eyes on.

The former Astrup Awning Factory has been converted into a new community, performance, and art space The Pivot Center, the Lofts at Lion Mills went from a former industrial warehouse into 36 units of affordable housing for families, right down the street from the corner of West 25th Street and Clark Avenue, one of the busiest intersections in the neighborhood. An old factory in Clark-Fulton is being converted into 60 units of affordable housing with 31,000 square feet of commercial space with a social service provider on the ground floor.

The Pivot Center is almost directly behind the land the young women were rescued from and already includes offices for the Cleveland Rape Crisis Center, Cleveland Museum of Art, LatinUs Theatre Company, Inlet Dance Theater, and will soon house an office for Councilwoman Santana. The center also houses the Cleveland Family Center for Mission Children and Adults. And the newest tenant FIG (Future Ink Graphics) scheduled to move in and open its first phase soon.

Councilwoman Jasmin Santana, Metro West, the City of Cleveland, MetroHealth, and The Cleveland Foundation are working on a comprehensive development plan for the community that will consolidate feedback from residents into a "playbook" for future developments.

"Current residents' opinions must be part of the process," said Councilwoman Santana. "And a focus needs to be on affordable housing so that residents who have been in Clark-Fulton for decades can stay."

The MetroHealth System's investment of a billion dollars in a renovation to its main campus location helped to spur some of the development. Besides the new hospital and medical facilities, MetroHealth is also investing \$60 million in a residential



development called "Vía Sana," translating to "healthy way."

The project will bring 72 affordable apartments and 5,000 square feet of space for the MetroHealth Economic Opportunity Center where residents will be able to train for jobs in the medical field or other professions.

When new developers come into Clark-Fulton, they will be able to reference the comprehensive plan to see what residents want and need and then shape their plans around those concerns. A final version should be complete in a few months.

Parade the Circle Events in the Neighborhood

Parade the Circle, the popular summer arts festival featuring a parade of art, stilts walkers and floats, will look different this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Cleveland Museum of Art announced that Parade the City will be this year's version of the popular arts parade instead will pair local artists with community groups to create art installations through Cleveland and community locations.

One location is the Pivot Center for Arts (formerly the Astrup Awning Factory building) that includes the museum's Community Arts Center which will open on June 12. There will also be an outside art installation at the center, 2937 W. 25th.

When the center opens on June 12, visitors of the Clark-Fulton building may view the inaugural exhibition, "Parade the Circle: Celebrating 30 Years of Art and Community," opening in tandem with the center, which features a varied collection of puppets, costumes and masks created by artists and the community that reflect diverse cultures and global art traditions.

The Community Arts Center will house the museum's community arts staff education outreach program, which creates experiences for residents in Greater Cleveland through art-making activities and community collaborations such as Parade the Circle, Chalk Festival Winter Lights Lantern Festival and Studio Go.

Besides the Community Arts Center, the 2021 Parade the City event will feature eight installations created by local artists with the help of eight community groups including the Cleveland Schools of Arts, Julia De Burgos Cultural Arts
