For details, call 844-330-2020. For Spanish-speaking citizens, call 844-468-2020.

Meanwhile, as we head into the fall season, I hope everyone stays safe and healthy. When the cold weather hits, we'll be spending more time indoors, so we'll need to be extra vigilant of the Covid threat.

At the same time, things in the ward are moving in a good direction with roads being resurfaced and other construction projects happening.



Voters must be registered by Monday, October 5 to vote in the **November 3 General Election.**

Be sure to count everyone at your address, even if they are

staying only temporarily. This includes relatives, nonrelatives, and children as young as one day old.







Voters <u>must be registered</u> in Cuyahoga County in order to vote in any election. In order to vote in Cuyahoga County, you must meet the following requirements:

- You must be a United States Citizen.
- You must be at least 18 years old on the day of the General Election.
- · You must be a resident of Ohio for at least 30 days.
- You must register to vote at least 30 days before an election to be eligible to vote.
- 17 year old residents can register and vote in a Primary Election if they will be 18 on or before the General Election. 17-year-olds can vote for candidates only.

When Hiring a Contractor for Home Improvement or Repair

- Interview each contractor you are considering; ask for and check references.
- Get estimates from at least three different contractors for comparison.
- Verify if a contractor is licensed, bonded and insured to do work in the City of Cleveland by calling the City of Cleveland Department of Building & Housing at 216-664-2910.
- Check with the local Better Business Bureau to see if a contractor has had any complaints.
- Never accept oral contracts! Insist on a written contract that includes the contractor's name, address, telephone number, license/registration number, a complete description of all work to be done, start and end date, total price, any additions or changes made, and any warranties including time lines.

Make sure that the contractor obtains a permit to do the work – DO NOT let the contractor convince you to get a homeowners permit for the work. Request to see the permit before the work begins.

Understand your payment options:

- DO NOT let the contractor arrange a loan for you.
- Make sure that you have an affordable payment schedule.
- DO NOT pay the full amount up front.
- Pay a reasonable down payment and pay the balance upon completion and final inspection of the project.
- AVOID PAYING CASH and always get a receipt for all payments. KEEP COPIES OF ALL YOUR PAPERWORK!

A Message from Cuyahoga County Division of Consumer Affairs

The Cuyahoga County Department of Consumer Affairs warns residents to hang up on utility scam calls that threaten disconnection.

Utility disconnection scams, which target residents and businesses, often spike before weekends or holidays.

Consumer Affairs has also received reports of utility scammers offering consumers a "refund" or discount as a ploy to get account or payment information.

Residents are cautioned:

- Utilities do not accept gift cards, money wires or Bitcoin payments.
- Never share Social Security numbers or banking information with anyone who calls you.
- If you have questions about your utility accounts, contact them using the number on the bill. Do not use callback numbers provided in robocalls.

Roundabout Q & A

E. 116th and Miles to Union will get a roundabout at the intersections of E.116th St./MLK/Farringdon. It will be the fourth in the city and the first in Ward 2. <u>Why are we getting a roundabout?</u> Reducing the amount of accidents in that area was the number one concern. Though roundabouts do not prevent all accidents, they do lower the chances of a collision significantly.

What are some benefits of roundabouts?

- Fewer and less severe crashes
- Lowers vehicle speeds
- Fewer delays
- Lower maintenance costs

How do I drive in a roundabout?

Slow down as you approach the roundabout. Keep an eye out for pedestrians and yield to vehicles on the left currently in the roundabout. Proceed to your desired street safely
