

New LED streetlight installation underway

Councilman Anthony T. Hairston has been working with Mayor Frank Jackson's administration on a massive project to brighten street lighting throughout the city and install security cameras in various public places.



The city council approved legislation to replace all street lights with high-tech LED lights, which provide more illumination than the existing conventional street lights.

Council's action authorizes the city to enter into various contracts for the purchase of related equipment and supplies.

Council had previously approved the sale of bonds to pay for the project, estimated at

\$25 million. The goal is to replace the city's 61,000 street lights. As of this writing, 73% have been converted. The LED lights are expected to reduce maintenance costs by 80 percent and energy costs by 10 percent.

Council also approved a companion piece of legislation that authorizes the city to purchase and install security cameras on city light poles located in high-crime and heavily travelled areas.

Cleveland Water Main Replacement Project

Cleveland Water will be replacing the water mains on the following streets:

- BURGESS AVE. (from Roseland Ave. to Euclid Ave.)
- WICKFORD RD. (from Wayside Rd. to Euclid Ave.)
- CLIFFVIEW RD. (from Roseland Ave. to Euclid Ave.)
- HILLVIEW RD. (from Roseland Ave. to Euclid Ave.)

The benefits of this much needed project:

- Reduction of the amount of water loss due to breaks and leaks.
- Ensurance that customers receive a dependable supply of quality water.
- Better reliability of water supplied to the neighborhood for enhanced fire protection.

Euclid Avenue in Euclid-Green Receives Funding for Major Transportation Study

In 2019, the Northeast Ohio Area Coordinating Agency (NOACA) awarded the city of Cleveland and Greater Collinwood Development, in partnership with the city of Euclid, a \$90,000 Transportation for Livable Communities (TLCI) planning grant to conduct a comprehensive transportation study along Euclid Avenue in the Euclid Green community, from the city's border with Euclid in the east to the city's boarder with East Cleveland in the west. This is a key study, as it is the only section of Euclid Avenue in Cuyahoga County to have not gone through an extensive planning process. Furthermore, this study will set the table for improved transit along the corridor, as well as provide a framework for future development in the area.

While COVID-19 has delayed the start of this planning process, work is moving forward on this transformative initiative. Stay tuned as this process develops and look out for how you can add your input to this process.

City Council authorizes funding for rent relief



The Five Pointes intersection will receive a \$50,000 investment in streetscaping, thanks to a grant awarded to Greater Collinwood Development Corporation from the Cuyahoga County Community Development Supplemental Grant program.

New streetscape

The Five Pointes Streetscape Project will implement recommendations from the September 24, 2018 Saint Clair Avenue Corridor Study. The St. Clair Avenue Corridor Study identified beautification, bike and pedestrian friendly amenities, and healthy lifestyle amenities as key needs. To address these needs, the Five Pointes Streetscape Project will provide **ladder style crosswalks, decorative place making banners, street trees, and bike racks.** The goals of this project are to foster: an **increase in pedestrian foot traffic** to support area businesses, **enhanced resident and visitor satisfaction and safety** with the area, **transportation equity** by providing access to bike racks in an area previously having none, improved pedestrian safety, and an enhanced sense of place for the Five Pointes Intersection.

Five Pointes is a vibrant intersection, home to Collinwood High School, the Cleveland Public Library Collinwood Branch, and the Five Pointes Retail District. Physical enhancements through this grant will benefit not only the Five Pointes area but the entire Collinwood community. Greater Collinwood Development Corporation will keep the community informed and involved as this project progresses.


