May Dugan Center's (MDC) Food, Clothing and Fresh Produce Distribution Program has been a safety net for low-income residents in Ohio City and its surrounding communities since its doors opened 51 years ago this year. **The program assists individuals struggling with food insecurity by offering food, clothing, and fresh produce on the 2nd and 4th Wednesday of every month of the year.** These distributions aim to alleviate hunger among low-income residents in the communities through these 20 distribution days. The program works in collaboration with the Greater Cleveland Food Bank, the Hunger Network, the Westlake PTA and other individual donations.

In addition to food and fresh produce, the program also provides health screenings, clothing and other necessities available for participants. This was a unique year for May Dugan due to the COVID-19 pandemic. It required the center to quickly adapt to meet all the safety protocols set forth by the Governor and local health departments to ensure the safety of the clients, staff and volunteers. In all of 2019, the center provided over 125,000 meals and during 2020 is projecting to



serve more than 400,000 meals. "We have recruited and involved more than 60 volunteers to assist with the packaging of bags of groceries and produce and to assist with loading the bags on distribution days, said Rick Kemm, Executive Director. We are grateful for the outpour of support from our neighbors, including Councilman Kerry McCormack."

It isn't unusual to see hundreds of cars backed up from W. 41st & Bridge all the way to W. 65th on distribution day. In addition to the food distribution, May Dugan has also served as a distribution site for toiletries, cleaning supplies and Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) during the pandemic with the support from Matthew 25 Ministries and the Cleveland Rapid Response Fund. Many of the individuals who have visited the center have never been to a food pantry before as a result of losing their jobs or being furloughed.

Father McNulty retires as pastor of St. Augustine Church after 43 Years

Councilman Kerry McCormack is offering well wishes to the **Rev. Joseph D. McNulty,** who retired this month as director of Catholic Charities Ministry to Persons with Disabilities for the Diocese of Cleveland and as pastor of St. Augustine Parish, a position he has held since

Father McNulty became pastor of St. Augustine Parish in Cleveland's Tremont

neighborhood after five years as associate pastor there. St. Augustine Church is known for, among other good works, its regular meals programs for the needy that for decades included Sister Corita. Sister Corita and Father McNulty made numerous media appearances appealing for volunteers and donations for their meal service, especially at holiday times.

Father McNulty, while associate pastor also was an instructor of religious education at Cleveland Central Catholic High School. He was also the Episcopal Liaison for Persons with Mental Illness and their families since 1988.

Ordained to the priesthood May 31, 1969,

his first assignment was as associate pastor of Parma's St. Francis de Sales Parish and coordinator of pastoral counseling at Nazareth Academy.

Prior to his ordination, he occupied part-time positions as both a supervisor and caseworker with the Department of Human Services, Cuyahoga County Welfare Department, and as a coordinator for Project

PEACE (Program of Educational and Cultural

Fr. McNulty's educational degrees include a Bachelor of Arts from Borromeo College of Ohio, a Bachelor of Sacred Theology from Catholic University of America, and both a Master of Theology and Master of Divinity from Cleveland's St. Mary Seminary.

Councilman McCormack is also welcoming

Fr. McNulty's replacement, Cleveland-native Fr. William "Bill" O'Donnell, C.PP.S. (Missionaries of

the Precious Blood). Fr. O'Donnell has worked in ministries outside of Cleveland and outside of the United States since leaving for seminary in 1964 and being ordained in 1977.



Tri-C offering free COVID testing

Drive-thru and walk-up COVID-19 testing will be offered at Cuyahoga Community College from December through April as part of a partnership with Care Alliance Health Center, a non-profit group providing medical services to residents, regardless of their ability to pay.

The free testing will take place on Thursdays, beginning Dec. 3, rotating between Tri-C sites throughout Cuyahoga County.

Testing at the Metropolitan Campus, 2900 Community College Ave., Cleveland, will take place in the Lot 4 underground garage off Community College Avenue.

The times are 11 a.m. to 4 pm, Jan. 14, Feb. 11, March 11 and April 8. An ID with


Additionally, testing will be offered at the Metro Campus by Care Alliance on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays for the remainder of November and throughout December.

Towpath Trail Stage 4 Update! The Towpath Trail travels down the route of the 1832 Ohio and Erie Canalway National Heritage Corridor from Cleveland to New Philadelphia. When completed, it will stretch over 101 miles. Here locally, Stage 4 of the Towpath Trail

is near completion and will run 1.5 miles from Literary Road. In Tremont to the future Canal Basin Park in the Flats neighborhood of Downtown Cleveland.

In September 2020, crews installed the pedestrian bridge spanning Literary Rd. connecting the northern end of stage 3 to the southern end of stage 4 via University Rd. Brush and weed overgrowth have been removed along University Rd. providing sweeping views of Cleveland and the Cuyahoga River Valley.


