Housing Needs Amplified

Throughout the year, the resounding theme has been the paramount importance of housing. Residents consistently voice the need for more housing options and increased flexibility within the existing housing landscape. Exciting news: the Blanket Mills Apartments are set to welcome their first residents in 2024!



Numerous programs and initiatives are in motion, underscoring my unwavering dedication to addressing local housing needs. This year, the City Council has also bolstered Building and Housing with additional inspectors, ensuring more homes are maintained in decent condition.



Legislative Achievements

This year, I proudly sponsored three impactful laws: the Paid Leave and the Safe Leave laws and the provision of Free Feminine Hygiene Products at City Centers. The Paid Leave Law gives city employees paid time off when they have or adopt a new baby. The Safe Leave Law now empowers city employees involved in domestic violence situations to take time off work safely and privately.

The Safe Leave Law hits close to home for me, remembering the challenges my family faced while I was growing up. We often had to abruptly leave dangerous situations, and my mom, in her attempts to provide stability for the family, lost several jobs. This legislation is a crucial support system for both men and women who have survived domestic violence, giving them the time needed to rebuild for themselves and their children.

Additionally, in a bid to address period poverty, city hall and city recreation centers now provide free pads and tampons for young women. It's a small but impactful step towards ensuring that basic necessities are accessible to all.

Blanket Mill Moves to Completion

With \$1 million secured from Cleveland City Council, the Blanket Mills Project in the Clark-Fulton neighborhood can finally be completed.

What was once a vacant, century-old factory complex will offer 60 low-income one- to three-bedroom apartments with high ceilings and large windows, as well as space for nonprofits to provide services and support including a day care.

"This is a project I've worked on since I was first elected to Council," said Ward 14 Councilwoman Jasmin Santana. "The financing of the renovations was very complicated. But I'm so excited and thankful that my colleagues on Council agreed that this was good use of the city's revenue recovery funding.

"This project is an exceptional addition to our neighborhood, and I am thrilled that many of our families will be able to stay in the neighborhood because of these affordable units."

The complex on W. 33rd Street dates to 1889 and was used for industrial purposes for nearly 120 years. Its name comes from its use by Beckman, Senior & Co. – later The Beckman Co. – to make wool horse blankets and carriage robes. It has sat vacant since 2008. It was the largest vacant property in the neighborhood.

The community parks hit the jackpot this year with significant developments! One Park wrapped up construction, another secured funding, and a third has kicked off its design phase. Recognizing the importance of parks and green spaces for our children, families in the neighborhood can now enjoy safe and vibrant community spaces right by their homes. Here are the highlights:

- Mercedes Cotner underwent a much-needed \$1.8 million remodel and reopened its gates this past summer.
- Storer Park, long neglected, received a \$250,000 investment, with the first round of improvements slated for 2024.
- Clark Park, situated next to Walton School, is in the funding stage, with an additional \$465,000 committed to enhance our parks.
- The Storer Ave Greenway is a work in progress, with initial designs featuring trees along the narrow corridor. This \$125,000 improvement aims to transform the concrete-focused street into a greener, more inviting space.

Two noteworthy City of Cleveland initiatives are currently underway: the Parks and Recreation Masterplan and Sustainability Cleveland's Climate Action Plan, attend a meeting to give your input. And let's not forget the community clean-up day for Clark Ave Planters, a collaborative effort between One Hope NEO and the Ward 14 Council office to fill those planters.



Leaves and Snow & Neighborhood Nuisances

Fall is beautiful in Cleveland, but it comes the inevitable arrival of leaves and then snow. For leaf management, you can bag them and place them for regular garbage pick-up until December 29th. Alternatively, leaves can be left on the ground or mowed over to create mulch. Please avoid raking leaves into the street, it can lead to blocked sewer basins and, when frozen, create hazardous

Finally, the Second District Police are seeking your help in reporting abandoned cars. While a car gets its first warning after 72 hours, it'll be towed if left unattended. Abandoned cars hog valuable parking space and obstruct snow plows.

Snow Removal 507.13

"Every owner, occupant, or person having charge of any tenement, building, lot or land fronting on any avenue, street, alley or other public highway shall clear the WHOLE SIDEWALK in front of said tenement, building or lot or land, of SNOW AND ICE.. and if it shall be impossible to remove all the snow and ice, the resident shall cover such snow and ice with a coating of ashes, sand or other substance as may be necessary to render safe travel and convenience." Shall keep the entire width of the sidewalk, free and clear of all earth, sand brick, stone, rubbish or other material.

Disposal of Snow Chapter 411, Sect. 411.02

"No person removing snow from any private driveway within the City shall deposit such snow upon the pavement of any public street or on any tree lawn on any public street, except the tree law immediately in front of the premises from which the snow is removed."
