

Councilman Kelly Fights to Make I-90 West Boulevard Exit Ramp Safe

Ward 11 residents have been diligently working hard to draw attention to the numerous accidents that have occurred on the 1-90 exit ramp to West Boulevard that has damaged three homes repeatedly. Cars crashing into their homes have plagued this neighborhood and it has been both costly and scary. Simply put, a perilous situation needed to be resolved. Enter Ward 11 Councilman Danny Kelly.

Sherry Heart, a resident who had been requesting assistance persistently, stated, "He badgered them (the Ohio Department of Transportation and the City of Cleveland), literally. I want to give praise to Danny Kelly." She also is grateful to the media outlets who have covered this story. All of her advocacy has paid off and collaborating with Councilman Kelly has expedited a permanent solution to this situation. Councilman Kelly and Sherry are kindred spirits. She is a long time IBEW Local 38 member and he a member of Laborers' Local 310. They hit it off right away as brother and sister union members and made a great team.

Getting to this solution has been a work in progress. In February of 2023, Councilman Kelly brought together representatives from Cleveland City Council, the Ohio Governor's office and ODOT to find a solution to a problem affecting three homes that sit directly in front of the exit ramp. Councilman Kelly Helps Invest \$1 Million in Programs to Prevent Violent Crime

Safety is a top priority for Councilman Danny Kelly and his colleagues have taken notice. Last year, Cleveland City Council Ordinance 486-2023 used \$10 million in American Rescue Plan (ARPA) funds to create a first-of-its-kind advisory committee that allocates funds to jump-start initiatives in Cleveland that will work to find solutions to the root causes of crime, such as poverty. The Cleveland Neighborhood Safety Fund is a long-term donor-advised fund of the Cleveland Foundation. When it came time to select members to serve on the advisory committee, Ward 11's own Councilman Danny Kelly made the list.

Councilman Kelly accepted the challenge saying, "I'm ALL IN! I enjoy collaborating with this talented group of advisors to keep our streets and homes safe. We can do that one-step at a time, by tackling the root causes of violent crime head-on as a team."

Councilman Kelly is one of three councilmembers serving on the advisory board. Joining him from Cleveland City Council are his colleagues, Ward 7 Councilwoman Stephanie Howse-Jones

and Councilman Kelly met with an ODOT representative twice to consider different options. Councilman Kelly stated, "He seemed willing to do whatever is necessary to expedite this project and I assured him that myself and my colleagues on Cleveland City Council are ready to go when they are to get this done. Once I had this cooperation, I was off and running to tackle this problem head-on."

First, Councilman Kelly addressed traffic calming solutions. In March of 2023, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) and the city of Cleveland installed multiple warning signs and changed the timing on the traffic light so that those getting off the freeway would have to stop. Councilman Kelly stated, "This is just the first step to ensure residents and drivers in Ward 11 are safe. The stop light will remain red, because people trying to catch the green light when they are coming down the exit ramp are getting into accidents." Also installed, flashing yellow lights and signs as drivers approach the I-90 West off-ramp to West Boulevard to signal drivers to slow down.

In July of last year, Councilman Kelly's legislation to install security cameras along the route, as well as a barrier wall and a triangle at the end of the ramp that would force traffic to not only slow down but to travel left or right, not straight into someone's home or yard passed with flying colors. The license plate reading cameras should deter criminals from using the ramp to evade police and will help police to identify hit-and-run suspects. "I am so grateful to my colleagues for supporting the safety of Ward 11 residents and to ODOT and the City of Cleveland for giving this issue the priority it so deserves," said Councilman Kelly.

Councilman Kelly, in the interim, was relentless in his pursuit of barricades to protect these homes and the children and families who fear walking outside on West Boulevard near the exit. In August, his diligence paid off. Over the course of the month, the City of Cleveland installed large cement barriers along the front yards in both directions of the homes impacted by multiple accidents. Simultaneously, construction bids to ODOT on

The project, intended to be a permanent solution to this issue, began at the end of August. Finally, ODOT completed the project at the end of 2023, by tapping into its emergency fund. Now, the off-ramp slopes down to a T-shaped intersection at West Boulevard, directly across from several homes that have sustained damage from sliding or out-of-control cars for decades. ODOT also added a splitter island to the intersection, which will force cars to turn left or right. A second island on the roadway acts as a backup stop for cars that go straight through the intersection. That is that: project complete!

"To bring this project home, we needed ODOT to tap into its emergency fund to expedite solutions to keep our neighbors safe from incoming traffic, because enough is enough. I have heard that sometimes cars even become airborne. I had to stick with my residents every step of the way. I worked in construction long enough to know how to keep my eye on a project and that is exactly what I did. Safety first. Angels Keep", said Councilman Kelly.

No garages. Must be current on property taxes or on a payment plan. Call WCDC to get information on the HHP Program.

WESTOWN 50/50 REBATE HOME REPAIR PROGRAM

Available for EXTERIOR only home repairs/maintenance. Including garages, driveways, and window/door replacement. Eligible homeowners receive a 50% rebate on repair costs. The rebate is capped at \$1,000.

CITY OF CLEVELAND EXTERIOR PAINT PROGRAM

Applications usually start in May and paint projects must be completed by mid-October. The program provides free paint vouchers to qualified applicants. Submit your application through Westown CDC.

BUILDING HOPE

Councilman Danny Kelly Partners with Greater Cleveland Habitat for Humanity to build \$1M in new homes and buy 2.8M HQ location in Ward 11.

FIVE NEW HOMES COMING SOON!

When Cleveland City Council voted to allocate \$5 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to Greater Cleveland Habitat for Humanity to increase access to affordable homeownership, Councilman Danny Kelly pointed out that there have not been any new houses built in Ward 11 for years, if not decades.

He said, "That needs to end now. We can, and we must, do better. If we want Ward 11 to be an affordable place to live, work, and age in place, we have to bust out our work gloves and build it from the ground up. Together!" The result: \$1M invested in Ward 11 for Habitat for Humanity to build five new modular homes in the heart of Ward 11. Soon shovels will hit the ground to begin building these 3-bedroom ranch homes, with over 1,350 sq. ft. of living space and a full basement.



The new homes in Ward 11 are part of a broader initiative that will benefit over 400 households in historically underserved neighborhoods by creating 50 new homeownership opportunities citywide. Councilman Kelly collaborated with Greater Cleveland Habitat for Humanity, his colleagues Council President Blaine A. Griffin, members Kevin Bishop (Ward 2), Deborah Gray (Ward 4), Michael Polensek (Ward 8), Jenny Spencer (Ward 15), and the Cuyahoga County Land Bank to bring this exciting project to life. "Thank you to everyone involved for including my ward in this moonshot project!" said Kelly.
