

Summer months in Cleveland mean time spent on the lake, cookouts, baseball games, and, yes, an increase in construction. Excuse our dust as we resurface your roads, work on infrastructure projects, and continue with park improvements. It's all happening in Ward 11 and together we can make it a vibrant place to be.

I have exciting news! The funding for Variety Theater is near completion and the next step will be for shovels to hit the ground in what will be the cornerstone of Ward 11's renaissance. The building is a theater, eight storefronts and thirteen two-story 600-sq-ft apartments that currently is laying vacant. Its rebirth as a new Lorain Avenue anchor will be a catalyst for economic development as Variety Village expands down the entire corridor. Filling our vacant storefronts on Lorain Avenue will eliminate eyesores and make our neighborhood safer and more stable. As an added bonus, right within the building, the restoration will bring 100 NEW JOBS into our ward. Not to mention the construction jobs it will bring into our neighborhood during its renovation.

Man's Heroic Action Saves Baby from House Fire

When John Stickovich, 62, a retired Laborers' Local 310 member who currently owns a repair business headed into work on May 6, 2024, he did not know yet how special the day would be. His quick thinking, bravery and the presence of mind to jump into action in a stressful moment ultimately helped save an 11-month-old baby trapped inside a burning house.

While driving, he saw smoke pouring from a two-story house on West 102nd, just south of Thrush Ave. Firefighters had not yet arrived, so the Good Samaritan decided to stop and see if he could help. When he did, he found

Samantha James outside, clutching a baby. James revealed that another infant remained trapped inside. "The mother was sitting on the lawn with her one baby and I asked her if she was all right and she said, 'My baby is still in the house, and I was thinking to myself, 'Oh my God, I have to save the baby!", he said.

What makes Stickovich's story even more amazing is that he tried THREE different entrances to get into the home and went into the fire TWICE to find the baby.

First, he immediately tried the front door, but could not get inside the home. Next, he ran to the side door of the house and kicked it in, but the smoke and flames were too heavy, so he went to the back of the house and crawled through an open door to the kitchen. Gaining entrance, he plunged into the smokefilled home, determined to rescue the child. However, there was no sign of the child.

He returned outside to James, who

informed him that the baby was located just outside the kitchen, next to the baby gate. Undeterred by the raging flames, he courageously reentered the blazing inferno, determined to find the infant. At first, he reached around while crawling in the thick smoke and found the gate, but not the baby. With unwavering determination, he ultimately located the child and swiftly brought her to safety. "I'm sure God had something to do with it", Stickovich said. "I believe that 100%. It was getting so bad in there that I was getting ready to leave actually and then the baby cried or made a sound. I put my hand out, grabbed her

leg, and then we were both out. If I wasn't guided by God when I was in that smoke, I never would have found her."

The story does not end there. In the interim, while Stickovich was risking his life, Fire Station #33 firefighters were experiencing their first Mayday in decades. In firefighter parlance, a Mayday is a distress call made for three main reasons: Firefighters are trapped, injured, or missing. In this case, the front porch came tumbling down on top of two Cleveland Firefighters from Engine 33. Ryan Ross was able to crawl out, but Pete Mauric remained pinned under the

debris. Acting decisively, the team rallied together to lift the wreckage and free Mauric, then proceeded to extinguish the blaze. The firefighters suffered a shoulder injury and leg burns and an ankle injury respectively.

Without the courage and quick thinking of Stickovich and the brave firefighters, lives could have been lost. Samantha James and babies Opal and Lotus are safe; as are two firefighters saved by their brethren. "Two rescues in one fire. It was quite a day! Thank you John 'Stick' Stickovich and members of Fire Station #33 Cleveland. We appreciate you", said Councilman Danny Kelly.

John Stickovich Receives A Hero's Welcome

John "Stick" Stickovich, known for his humility and heroism, downplayed his bravery, saying he would do it for anyone. However, it is only fitting and proper that Stickovich, who tried three times to enter the blaze, received accolades three times for his heroism.

On May 9, Cleveland Firefighters at Fire Station #33 hosted a rescue reunion for him, the baby, and the firefighters. On June 3, Councilman Danny Kelly presented him with a resolution at Cleveland City Council, where he received a standing ovation. Finally, on June 5, Laborers' Local 310 honored him at their monthly meeting, celebrating his heroism with another standing ovation.

Stickovich's story is a testament to the existence of real-life heroes.
