Looking ahead into next year, here are a couple of items that are on the radar that may interest you:

- Davinwood Park planning meeting, date/time TBD: The Office of Capital Projects is working with me to initiate a park planning process for Davinwood Park, located adjacent to Douglas MacArthur School. The hope is to gain feedback from area residents on what they would like to see in the park, so that we can work collectively towards park improvements.
- **Gunning pool reopening, date/time TBD:** Work continues on the full rebuild of the indoor pool at Gunning Recreation Center,

with completion anticipated in the first half of 2025

• Old Lorain Trail opening, date/time TBD: Construction work will begin over the winter on the new Metroparks trail that will link Kamm's Corners and the Rocky River Valley. We are hopeful that the project will be completed in 2025.



## **Cleveland City Council Ward** Redistricting

In 2008, Cleveland voters approved an amendment to the City Charter that pegs the number of City Council wards against population, with each ward comprising approximately 25,000 residents. Since that time, citywide population loss has resulted in the reduction of Cleveland City Council wards from 21 to the current number, 17.

Cleveland's official population is determined by the decennial Census, which last occurred in 2020. Given that the Census occurred amidst the Coronavirus Pandemic, there is widespread speculation that many Cleveland residents did not fill out the Census. Regardless of whether or not that is the case, Cleveland's official population is 372,624. Because the population is officially below 375,000, the Charter requires that Council be reduced from 17 to 15 wards.

At this time, Cleveland City Council has retained a consultant who is charged with dividing Cleveland into 15 proposed wards. Ultimately, Cleveland City Council is required to pass legislation that will institute a 15-ward map. It is anticipated that this work will be finalized in the coming months, in anticipation of the 2025 municipal election.



New Cleveland wards must have an average of 24,842 residents, with a maximum of 26,084 and a minimum of 23,600.

Population decline across Cleveland has not been evenly distributed. Compared to much of the city, Ward 17's population of 23,600 has been very stable. In fact, data indicate modest population growth across West Park.

At this time, new ward lines remain unknown. However, it is fair to speculate that redistricting will have a minimal impact on Ward 17, considering its population and location on the edge of Cleveland. It is plausible that Ward 17's current boundary may expand slightly and be renumbered to 15. In any case, please keep an eye on the redistricting process as it is important in ensuring that your voice is represented at City Hall.

### **Lead Testing**



Among American cities, Cleveland has one of the nation's highest rates of children with elevated lead levels. Young children, especially those under 6, are especially susceptible to lead poisoning because their developing brains and bodies absorb it more easily. Juveniles are affected by lead poisoning when exposed at a young age and it continues to impact their mental and physical development. This can have lifelong impacts.

Although Lead Poisoning has been an issue for many years, lead poisoning came into the national spotlight ten years ago due to the Flint water crisis in Michigan. Two things worth knowing are:

### When is bulk garbage collection?

Bulk garbage collection is always the first full week of every month (note, the week begins on Sunday.) Households can place up to 3 bulk items at the curb every month. Cleveland residents can also take bulk items to the Ridge Road Transfer Station, located on Ridge Rd. between Denison Ave. and Memphis Ave.

### Is the City still recycling?

Yes, the City is still recycling. However, the program requires households to opt in. After opting in, residents receive stickers to place on their blue can. The recycling truck only collects from cans with these stickers. Cans without stickers are emptied into the regular garbage truck to prevent non-recyclables from contaminating the load. If you wish to opt in to recycling, contact Councilman Slife's office and we will drop off stickers along with details on what can and cannot be recycled.

### Who determines who does/ does not get leaf pick up?

The Department of Urban Forestry determines which areas of the city get curbside leaf pick up, based upon the number and size of treelawn trees within a neighborhood. Most of Cleveland does not receive curbside **leaf pick up.** The stated purpose of the leaf pick up program is to prevent leaves from treelawn trees, which the City owns, from clogging sewers. It is not designed to be a landscaping service for trees on private property.

### Historically, Forestry has determined to collect leaves in 3 zones:

- North of Lorain Avenue, east of Rocky River Drive
- Streets near Drakefield Park

 West of Rocky River Drive, between Lorain Ave. and Puritas Ave.

Leaves are collected by the same workers that plow snow. After plowing is complete, which can be days depending on the amount of snowfall, crews revert back to leaf collection.

Regardless of location, all residents can bag leaves. Waste Collection will accept up to 20 bags of yard waste every week throughout the year. Alternatively, leaves can be mulched. This adds organic matter to the soil and diverts organic materials from landfills.

### Who do I call about burnt out street lights?


All streetlights in Cleveland are owned and operated by Cleveland Public Power, even in Ward 17 where CPP doesn't provide power to customers. You can report a burnt out street light by contacting Councilman Slife's office.

### How has the City determined where to install speed tables?

Cleveland has begun installing speed tables as a way to calm traffic on residential streets. The Division of Traffic Engineering has conducted traffic studies across the city and has prioritized side streets where traffic volumes are higher and where data show that speeding is persistent.

At this time, speed tables have been installed at three locations in Ward 17:

- Chatfield Avenue
- W. 157th Street
- W 165th Street

**Rank/Name:** Ranger, K-9

**Year you joined CPD: 2022** 

Why did you become a police **officer?:** I get to help our community by going on crazy adventures where I find drugs the humans can't find. I also get

### What is your favorite part of the job?: My human says we're going to

### **LEAD TESTING CONTINUED**

- 1. Cleveland has a higher rate of childhood lead poisoning than Flint, and
- 2. The source of lead poisoning in Cleveland has been proven to come from lead-based paint, not water - Cleveland Water does not contain lead and the utility successfully prevents lead leaching out of water pipes through chemical treatment.

While lead poisoning rates are much lower in Ward 17 compared to citywide averages, it is still an important public health matter due to our older housing stock. Lead-based paint was banned in 1978, which means that a significant percentage of homes across Cuyahoga County contain lead based paint. Children become vulnerable to lead poisoning when deferred maintenance and existing lead paint hazards such as chipping paint create dust that can be inhaled or ingested. A significant source of contamination is older windows and doors, painted floors and exterior deteriorated wood siding. When painted building components

rub against each other by walking on floors or opening and closing windows a lead dust is created. Children crawling on floors and pulling themselves up onto window sills can come into contact with lead dust if areas of potential exposure are not addressed.

Some toys, Mardi Gras beads, certain facial makeups and home remedies also contain

It is best to hire a professional or contact the local city Health Department if you are concerned about items in your home containing lead. The rule of thumb is that if the house was built prior to 1978 there is a strong possibility that there are lead painted components.

Lead paint does not pose a serious risk to children when it is stabilized and encapsulated by fresh paint, when windows are replaced, and when chipping paint is **removed.** Routine hand washing and healthy diets can also reduce the likelihood of being exposed to lead.

If children live or visit your home frequently, (more than 6 hours per week) be sure that they get a blood test for lead when visiting the doctor. If you live in a rental unit, your landlord is required to obtain a lead safe certificate from the City of Cleveland.




