DIVISION OF WASTE COLLECTION

Set Out Guidelines

WEEKLY WASTE

- ▶ **Please contain all waste in the carts provided by the city:**
 - Use black/gray city issued cart for household trash and bagged yard waste.
 - NO trash should be placed outside of the black/gray cart.
- ▶ **Place carts out no earlier than noon the day before your regular pick up day.** Remove carts by noon the following day. If possible, use off street parking on your collection day.

BULK DISPOSAL

- ▶ **You may set out a limit of 3 bulk items.**
 - Such as tables and chairs, mattresses and box springs, couches, furniture.
 - All mattresses, box springs, leather and cloth furniture must be wrapped in plastic.
 - The city does not accept construction material (toilets, drywall, wood, etc.)
 - Boxes and bags are not bulk items.
- ▶ **You may set out up to 4 tires (passenger tires only).** Tires must be off the rim. Call 216-664-3711 to schedule a 4 tire pick up.

YARD WASTE

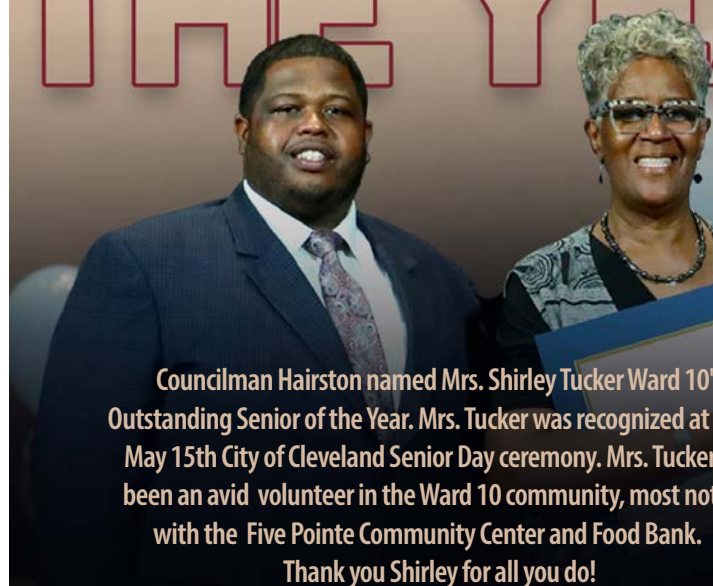
- **Branches must be cut and bundled.** (Each bundle cannot exceed 3 ft. in length and 2 ft. in diameter.)
- All leaves and grass clippings must be contained, up to 20 bags per week.

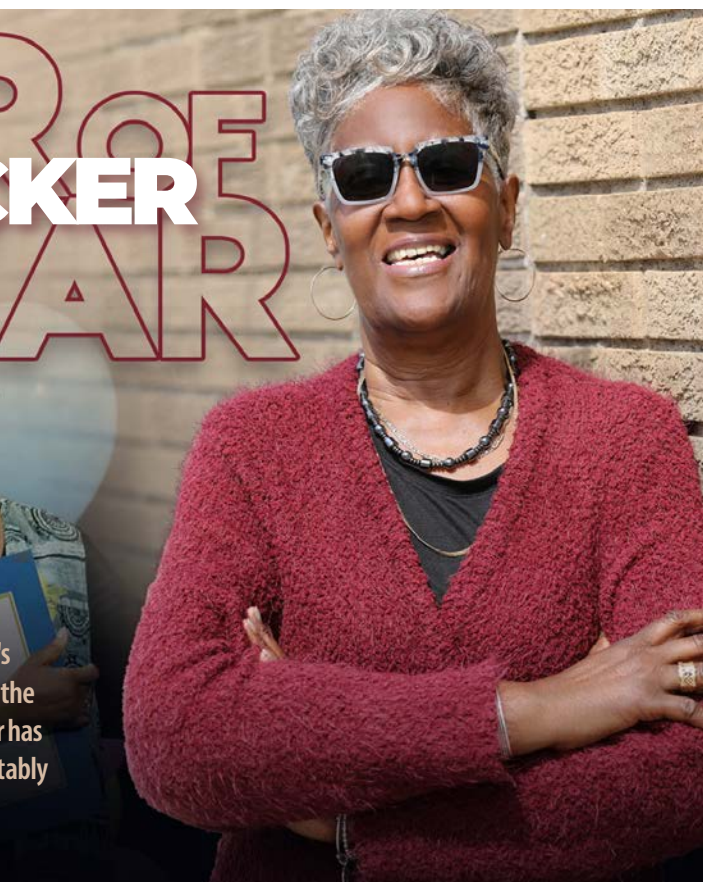

City Council's Investment in Affordable and Quality Homes

The shortage of affordable and quality homes is not just a Cleveland problem. It's a national problem. But at City Council, we work collaboratively with each other and our residents to address problems like the shortage of homes and much more.

Earlier this year, **Council provided a nearly \$10 million grant to the Cuyahoga Land Bank to address the shortage.** This grant will help fund the "Legacy Communities Revitalization Program" (LCRP). It will be used to build and renovate homes in Ward 10 in the Collinwood and Glenville neighborhoods, as well as in two other wards in the central city and near-west side.

The \$10 million grant was provided through Federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. City Council is responsible for awarding funds to areas such as affordable and quality homes to help our neighborhoods and residents recover from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The LCRP will be used to:

- Bridge financial gaps to support the construction of affordable housing in the target wards.
- Facilitate cost-effective revitalization of existing structures to expand affordable housing options.
- Strategically acquiring properties to prevent blight and further housing development efforts.
- Implement a pilot program to enhance the visual appeal of neighborhoods within our neighborhood.

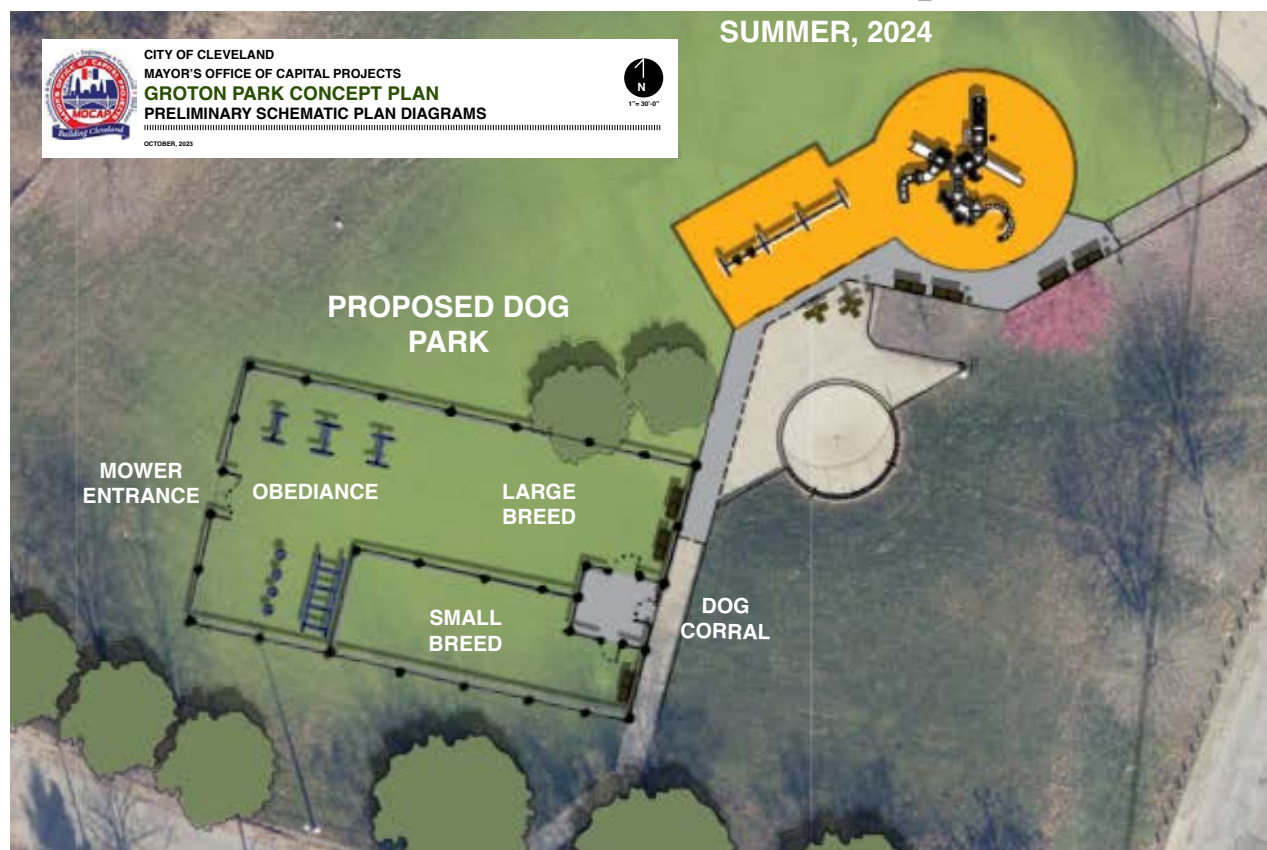


As your Councilman, I will continue fighting for and bringing results to every community in Ward 10.

The opportunity to collaborate with the Cuyahoga Land Bank presents promising expectations for developing affordable homes in communities that are often overlooked.

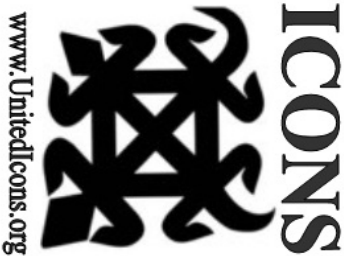
